Due to the lock down and partial closure in January 2021, The use of this grant will be reviewed in April 2021 and objectives and use of funding adjusted accordingly. These decisions will be made in light of assessments made w/c March 22nd following the wider opening of school.

Objectives of spending Covid catch-up:

To accelerate the progress of children in light of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Current situation

Reading: (whole school data)

- In December pupil attainment was approximately 6 months behind the expected standard.
- Approximately 36% of the pupils are at developing + stage of their year group expectations in March according to tests/TA compared to a typical 66% in previous years at this time.
- 69% of children are within their Age-Related Expectations of their year group compared to 79% who were within their year group March 2020.

Writing: (whole school data)

- In December pupil attainment was approximately 6 months behind the expected standard.
- Approximately 32% of the pupils are at developing + stage of their year group expectations in March compared to a typical 57% in previous years at this time.
- 63.5% of children are within their Age-Related Expectations of their year group compared to 77% who were within their year group March 2020.

Maths: (whole school data)

- In December pupil attainment was approximately 6 months behind the expected standard.
- Approximately 43% of the pupils are at developing + stage of their year group expectations in March compared to a typical 62% in previous years at this time.
- 72.5% of children are within their Age-Related Expectations of their year group compared to 81% who were within their year group March 2020.

Phonics:

- In Year 2, 73% have passed the Phonics Screening Check.
- Reception have had to teach Phase 1 phonics for the first time ever due to the lack of foundation 29% at Phase 1 and 71% at Phase 2.
- Year 1 are teaching both Phase 3 and Phase 5 24% at Phase 3 and 76% at Phase 5.
- Year 2 are teaching a range of Phases: between Phase 3 and Phase 6 19% at Phase 3, 12% at Phase 4, 19% at Phase 5 and 50% at Phase 6.

EYFS:

- In December baseline data indicated a lower proportion of pupils were on track in their 'ARE' than typical. Areas of concern are: -Understanding; Self Care/Self Awareness; Managing Feelings & Behaviour; Making Relationships; and GLD.
- From March assessments 64% are predicted at GLD.
- Reading 80% working within 40-60m.
- Writing 66% working within 40-60m.
- Number 80% working within 40-60m.

Wellbeing

- 99% of pupils returned in March 2021 following publication of a comprehensive plan that had been shared with parents.
- All staff returned in March 2021.
- Pupils were excited to return to school and see their peers. Attitudes to learning have been very positive.
- A group of pupils struggling with confidence and anxiety and/or needing support for mental health.
- A group of children in Reception with social and emotional, behavioural and toileting issues.
